On Sunday, 24 of us went out to pick up trash along the Rivanna. We split into two groups. One group went to Darden Towe and the other group went to Riverview. I was with the Darden Towe group, and Val led the Riverview

group.



At Darden Towe, the better traveled areas were pretty clean, but we still found candy wrappers, cigarette butts, and other trash. Once we ventured deeper into the woods, we found lots more trash, especially in areas by the river where people congregate. There were bottles, cans, bags, and even diapers. No, we didn't change the world by picking up a few bags of trash. Yet, the stuff we picked up isn't littering the landscape any more.

The project connects with our September ecotheology theme. As I wrote in this column last week, ecotheology is a branch of liberation theology, which emphasizes *right action* (orthopraxis) over *right belief* (orthodoxy). In this case, taking care of God's creation is the right action. Ecotheology follows the notion of putting our faith into practice, and it encourages us to think about the impact our actions have on the planet. Picking up trash was an expression of our faith and allowed us to be God's hands and feet (1 Corinthians 12.27).

More than the impact picking up trash had on our environment, the time was good fellowship. Beginning with pizza
