Iona Abbey-Musings on the Miracles

I am going on a spiritual retreat next week. Over the years, I have experienced God during a number of different retreats. Each one was a blessing, and I am lucky to have been able to go on them.

Sometimes retreats are in silence, like the times I've spent at Holy Cross Abbey in Berryville, VA. Other retreats have vibrant leaders, good music, and wonderful worship. One of my favorites was the Greenbelt Festival in 2008 near Cheltenham, UK. We heard speakers like Philip Yancey and John Bell and music from Beth Rowley and Linchpin. There was even a hymn-sing in the biergarten. Retreats come in all shapes and sizes.

Retreats are an opportunity for growth. Jesus modeled this idea of taking time away for spiritual growth (e.g., Matthew 14.23; Mark 1.35, 6.46; Luke 5.16, and 6.12). On each occasion, Jesus retreated to pray and prepare for what God was calling him to do. By getting away from the distractions of daily life, one can focus fully on listening to God and trying to be attuned to the Holy Spirit.

Next week, I am going to <u>lona Abbey</u> for a retreat led by <u>John Bell</u>. <u>lona Abbey</u> is part of the wider <u>lona Community</u> and dates back to 563 CE when <u>St. Columba</u> brought Christianity to Scotland. It is the cradle of Celtic Christianity. George Pattison, a theologian and friend, described lona to me as one of the "thin spaces." Thin spaces (Irish: caol 'ait) is a term to describe places where the physical and spiritual world feel particularly close.

To get to Iona, I will fly to Edinburgh, take a train to Oban, catch a ferry to Craignure on the Isle of Mull, ride a bus across

For me, the journey is part of the retreat. Traveling to get to the abbey, I will be aware of why I am going and preparing for my time there. Reversing the course to travel home, I will reflect on my experience.

The focus of my retreat is "Musing on Miracles." The description states: "There are over thirty miracles in the gospels; but a combination of science and skepticism seems to have diminished interest in the phenomena. In this retreat we will look at the miracles, not as puzzles to be solved, but as some of Jesus' most profound teaching blocks regarding justice, humanity and God's biases." Over the last few months, I've been rereading these miracle stories in the gospels and thinking about what they mean.

Please pray for me while I am away. I will be praying for you. And, I look forward to sharing the experience with you when I return.



Vicki and Brian Miller shop for the food and buy in bulk. We ask members and friends of the church to help fund this ministry by designating their monetary gifts for this purpose. We are no longer accepting food donations as we have more purchasing power buying in bulk with your donations.

Currently we have three people who deliver the bags to Venable each Thursday. We could use some more volunteers to do this: we deliver the bags between 9:00 am and 12 noon. And, we invite individuals and small groups to pack bags to have ahead of delivery; we are giving out approximately 25-30 bags per week. This is an easy way to be involved in a worthwhile ministry and to help these foodinsecure children. State Missions Offering

ing a check to the church (Make the check out to University Baptist Church and write State Missions in the "for" line). Here is some information from Chaplain Jerusha Moses, whose ministry our offering will support:

Dear friends, Due to "separation of church and state," GraceInside is a nonprofit Christian ministry that places chaplains inside Virginia's prisons so that lives may be transformed through the grace of Jesus Christ. As a GraceInside chaplain, I am dedicated to meeting the spiritual needs of all residents of Virginia's state prisons. I currently serve in Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women, providing one-on-one pastoral care, conducting worship services, and working with the Department of Corrections staff in offering rehabilitative programs. I am also responsible for scheduling all religious programs conducted by volunteers representing many faith traditions like Islam, Messianic Judaism, Wicca, Buddhism, Seventh Day Adventism, and Protestantism.

As the temperature gets cooler and the leaves change color, I am reminded that God's mercies are new every morning; God continues to work patiently in our lives, transforming us, and sanctifying us to the likeness of the image of God's son, Jesus. What an honor it is to partner with the Savior bringing faith, hope, and love to incarcerated men and women, as Christ says in Matthew 25, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

Bio: Chaplain Moses is an ordained Baptist minister. She completed her masters degree in divinity and a doctorate degree in ministry at the Baptist Theological Seminary in Richmond. She majored in biblical studies and obtained a masters degree in theology at the Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond, Virginia. She taught World Religions as adjunct faculty at Virginia Commonwealth University. Her doctoral project was in the field of grief and loss. She lives in Richmond with her fifteen-year-old daughter,

a stage 4 cancer survivor. Her grandparents were a major influence on her life; they retired from the Department of Corrections in India and told her bedtime stories of their work in Corrections. The stories took deep root in her impressionable heart and are the reason for her passion for prison ministry today.

Church Council Update

Church Council met last Sunday and discussed many positive things happening and challenges, as we continue to regather from the pandemic. Our Touch-A-Truck event last Saturday was attended by over 350 people. Based on this community response, we plan to have another Touch-A-Truck next spring.

We also affirmed the upcoming Christian Education ministry that Tommy Deal has agreed to lead. Tommy brings many years of experience in ministry to this role.

Our ministry to students is growing as evidenced by the numerous college students you see in worship each week, and our Youth group continues to gather each Sunday after worship. More volunteers are needed to supply meals and assist with activities.

In the staff personnel area, Marcus is reducing his social media outreach efforts as he devotes more time to family. We will be hiring a UVA student intern to assist with social media for this semester and possibly next semester.

An area of challenge is our financial giving. Our contributions decreased during the pandemic and continue to be below our needs. Our Finance Committee and the new Development and Growth team are working to assess our financial picture long term. Your continued support of the budget is vital.
