The Importance of Gratitude

Thanksgiving is just a few days away. Soon, many people will pause and acknowledge the blessings that surround us. True gratitude means appreciating what you have. This goes beyond a simple "thank you" and reflects a deeper sense of seeing the good. Thanksgiving is a good exercise, because God calls us to be in a continual state of giving thanks to God. The psalmist writes, "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever" (Psalm 107:1).

Gratitude is good for us, too. Social scientists have linked gratitude to improved mental health. Expressing thankfulness often can contribute to a positive outlook on life. It reduces feelings of stress and anxiety, and it can help our emotional well-being. Gratitude is also good for our physical health and reduces stress. Having a thankful heart helps relationships of all types. Grateful people are happier people. Gratitude is "wanting what we have" and encourages self-reflection and personal growth.

The evidence supporting my thesis (gratitude is important) is overwhelming. However, you probably already know that and you are good at it. I appreciate how often many of you find creative ways to show your appreciation. This Thanksgiving, I have so many things for which I am grateful.

chase a poinsettia in honor of or in memory of a loved one, please complete an order form. You can find a form in the narthex, the church office, or by clicking here.




Jazz Vespers
